November 13, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 8:00AM by John Lannamann (Chair).

- Welcome and Introductions John welcomed and thanked everyone for attending the November 13,
 Board Meeting, the last meeting this year.
- 2. <u>Fairfield Glade Police Department Update (FGPD)</u> Capt. Rosser advised they are in the middle of the Citizens Academy, and it is going very well. The participants have taken a tour of the jail, the coroner's office explained how they handle a dead body, and the drug dogs were brought in from Crossville. The Police Department is winding down its work from the flooding disaster where relief supplies were taken to east Tennessee.

Crime-wise, everyone should have received an email regarding the car break-ins at the golf courses and racquet club. Since the incident happened only one day it is believed to have been done by someone staying at a timeshare. When crimes happen that fast all at once for a short period of time, it is usually the result of short time transient visitors. Also, by chance, the county tactical team was in the area training when an incident occurred at Wilshire Heights of an individual holding a gun to his head. The team responded instantly and was able to defuse the situation, with one of the county's officers developing a rapport with the person and was able to talk him down.

Capt. Rosser provided all attendees with the October Police monthly report and discussed the various statistics. For burglaries, we had an incident that hasn't occurred in a couple of years and that was theft from a construction site. He said Westchester Rd continues to have a high number of speeders and they devote a lot of time to the area. EMS assists were way up, resident assists were up, and pet nuisances were almost double for the month. A new officer has been welcomed and a recent drug-takeback at Food City brought in 43 pounds to be disposed of. He advised when unused drugs are turned in, it is not necessary to remove labels from the bottles. All drugs (bottle and all) are sealed in a secure container that is sealed and completely incinerated.

Scams are up and Capt. Rosser said the quicker someone can notify their bank when fraud is suspected, the better. A gift card, cash or wire transfer are unrecoverable. But some bitcoins can possibly be recovered if reported quickly enough. Credit cards that have fraudulent charges need to be reported as soon as possible to the credit card company. There is a time limit on how long credit card companies can help, with many only go back 90 days or possibly less, for fraudulent charges. So, it is important to check statements/accounts on a regular basis. Scammers try to represent a company that you are familiar with such as Medicare, banks or familiar businesses. They will try to tell you that an immediate response is needed and how you need to pay or need to provide personal information, these are all warning signs of possible fraud. Always remember, you never have to pay to receive winnings.

- 3. <u>Fairfield Glade Fire Department Update (FGFD) –</u> Leon reported that the Fire Department responded to 17 calls in October and 125 year-to-date. Most of the calls are false alarms (30%) and EMS (30%). For fire prevention, 32 smoke detectors were installed in October with 282 year-to-date and 20 batteries installed with 160 year-to-date. They also responded to 3 smoke detector checks and installed 22 address signs.
- 4. <u>Approval of Minutes</u> Jan made a motion to approve the October 9, 2024 Board Meeting minutes; John seconded and the motion carried.
- 5. Fairfield Glade Resident Services (FGRS) John Wedgworth said it has been a wonderful year for FGRS. They embarked on a very heavy marketing and education program to other key state covers in our community. FGRS has been very successful in recruitment and building relationships with key people. People will not be knocking on your door and asking what your organization does, you have to be out there, and you have to knock on doors and educate people on what you are doing. It has been a monumental challenge at FGRS, but John is proud to say they are there and doing very well. Last month the Cumberland Now magazine featured an article about FGRS and two of their programs, the Way To Go and Home Safety programs. It's all about building relationships. To be successful you need to educate your people and then go out and market yourself. The Way To Go program is by far the most popular program, Home Safety has almost doubled since last year, and the free blood pressure clinic has been very successful every Thursday at the Village Green Mall from 10-12:00 with an average 30-35 people getting blood pressure checks.
- 6. <u>Treasurer's Report</u> Phyllis reported two checks were written during the month of October, mainly for the coordinator's appreciation event.
- 7. <u>Membership</u> Cyd reported we have one new group on Meadowview which brings us to a total of 61 neighborhood watch groups.

8. Old Business –

- Annual Meeting approximately 26 coordinators attended the event. (See additional comments under New Business).
- Election results the three open director positions were uncontested. Thank you to Cyd and Jan for agreeing to continue on the board and a big welcome to Darby Lannom for filling the Law Enforcement Director position.

9. **New Business** –

- How to get people involved in Neighborhood Watch Cyd asked for suggestions on what we can do to increase the number of coordinators attending the annual meeting. The bylaws state we must have the annual meeting, but what can we do to encourage more participation besides having the three speakers (County Sheriff, Police chief and Fire chief). Cyd will be creating a description on the "role of a coordinator" and asked everyone to review and provide comments. John Wedgworth suggested a representative from FGNWC speak at a Ladies Club meeting and to other organizations to introduce and promote FGNWC. Before the March board meeting, all board members are asked brainstorm ways to promote and increase the exposure of FGNWC.
- Darby Lannom was introduced. Darby will serve as the Law Enforcement Director. He graciously provided the board members with a quick snapshot of his background.
- Budget Phyllis indicated creating a budget will be a challenge as FGNWC has very inconsistent reoccurring expenses and income but will work to have something available for the March meeting.
- Tip Sheets John and Susan will review some of the tip sheets to make sure they are up to date.
- Main Page of the Website Evelyne will work with our web master to refresh our website.

The next Board meeting will be held on March 12, 2025, at 8:00AM, at the FG Police Department. FGNWC Board Meetings are open to all residents.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:05AM.


